Parking Survey

In late July we conducted a neighborhood survey regarding parking. This information is to help inform council member Lisset Hanewicz who is looking at neighborhood parking city wide to develop potential recommendations for changes to the neighborhood Residential Parking Permit (RPP) ordinance. A big thank you to everyone who responded and a very special thank you to neighbor Brian Merrell who manages our website and who helped create the online survey and to Laura Lorenzen for preparing the emails.

Sixty two percent of respondents indicated that parking is NOT a "major concern" on the street near their home, and 66% indicated that they DO NOT support implementing RPPs in the neighborhood. However 61% of those who live within one block of 4th Street N or MLK, Jr. Street N did say that parking IS a "major concern" on the street near their home. However, 56% of these same respondents still DID NOT support implementing RPPs in the neighborhood. The overwhelming concern with implementing RPPs noted by 70% of all respondents was over how guests would park. To see the full results, visit crescentheightsneighborhood.com.

I was recently asked to write a short article about my connection to Crescent Heights and our home. Good grief! How does one write a "short" article about one's last forty four years of life at our home in Crescent Heights. Perhaps sharing a brief history of my childhood will help one to understand my deep-abiding connection to our marriage, home, and community. Father was raised on a Native American Reservation in NY and when we four boys were old enough to walk, we were taught the ways of the woods, Creation, and the Creator. During 1950 we moved to St. Petersburg. The first year here our home burned to the ground. We lost everything but our lives. It would be the Red Cross, Moose Lodge, Coast Guard, (where Father was employed), and kind neighbors that helped with used temporary housing, clothing, and food. Six months later an auto crash took our Mother and baby brother. We would never be the same again. I was four years of age at the time. It was impossible for me to sleep in the house without recurring physiological trauma of being trapped in the car and loss of family. Consequently, I lived in a lean-to in the woods where Meadowlawn Jr. High School is now. During 1953 the north city limit was 54th Ave N. All points north were woods. Food was oranges, tangerines, grapefruits, mulberries, avocados, finger bananas, papaya, mangoes, fish, and bird eggs. At age six I enrolled for school at 54th Avenue Elementary School. Mr. Waters the principal insisted that I wear shoes and provided me with my first pair. I went to work at Seller's Nursery .25 cents an hour, three hours every day after school, four hours on Saturday. At age eight I bought a bicycle and delivered newspapers. I began to view other people's homes and how they lived. Seller's Nursery, and paper route customers were good to me. During cold rainy days, I would stop at Al's Gulf gas station and go sit in the corner of his office on the floor to warm up. Sometimes he would say, "Kid, you look cold" and give me a free cup of hot chocolate. Toppings Sandwich shop would sometimes state "Kid, you look hungry, sit here and I'll make you a sandwich". By age sixteen in 1967 I enlisted in The U.S. Merchant Marine and volunteered for hazardous duty. 10% extra pay, double pay when in the war zone. My goal was to one day marry, have a real family, and home. Returned to St. Petersburg during 1974, and was hired by the St. Petersburg Fire Department, all college tuition was paid for paramedic training. From the first, most patients were treated according to protocol...and all if as though one was a family member. Assigned to #4 fire station Crescent Heights, Woodlawn, and parts of old NE were primary responses. Patients were nearby neighbors and all injuries and tragedies were experienced by me as well. One day I discovered 602-24th Ave N. home was for sale and in 1978 closed for \$42,800. During those days all avenues and streets were brick, some had sidewalks, and all the homes were of 1920's- 1950's vintage.

Where Winn Dixie is now was A&P grocery, Ace Hardware was Swanson's Grocery, Tripp's was Lang's Ice Cream, then Country Kitchen, Dave's Restaurant, now Tripp's, 30th Ave and 4th Street was a travel campground, now Fresh Market, a boxing club is now Trader Joe's, Holiday Apts. on 4th Street is now a strip store, and across from our home was Crescent Lake Apts. now Town Homes. In 1979 I married Eva and our home became more complete with her, our growing family, and the subsequent four children. I retired in 2000 and over the years have reflected on all my blessings of our marriage, family, community, and opportunity. On cold rainy nights I snuggle a little closer to Eva and whisper how fortunate we are, we have shelter, we are sleeping on a bed with clean sheets, relatively safe, we have each other, health, food in the cupboards, and even have a refrigerator full of food, and are debt free. 602 isn't just a place to get mail, park our vehicles, or considered a financial investment, it's HOME, a sanctuary of many positive memories. Crescent Heights isn't just a neighborhood, rather it's considered our extended family, including the mail delivery person, sanitation truck operator, and the water meter reader. These written words will never adequately describe my gratitude for family, home, and community. All are blessings that a four-year-old child couldn't imagine, yet was able to overcome and rewrite one's life script. I thank all for contributing to who I am today and wish all peace, health, and happiness.

At 3:30 am on May 1st, I was awake working in the back of my house under deadline at the home we have lived in since 2002. We are a family of four. After hearing some noises towards the front of our home, I thought it was a bit early to be our oldest son, Harrison, who always gets up first. No, the noises turned out to be the crackling of nearly 100-year-old wood on our front porch. On fire. Seriously on fire. We ran out the back to our neighbor screaming to us from the front "Is anyone in there!?" repeatedly. God, Buddha, or aliens somehow decided it was not our time to go. By the time the alarms went off, it was almost too late, and I will forever wonder how lucky we were I was awake.

Directly following the fire, we were immediately humbled by the amount of support from family, friends, and most notably our Crescent Heights neighbors. We have tried to send thank you notes to each and every one of you. A big thank you to Sal + Dean for organizing all your donations, Bebe for quickly finding us a beautiful rental only 2 blocks away, and our direct neighbor Tim for all the hospitality he has shown us. We are still seeking rental accommodations to carry us from Jan to May 2024 (or until the house is finished).

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Nature Watch South

Our Urban Ospreys • Bill Richkus

Many different types of wildlife have adapted to living in urban environments such as ours. Most do so not by choice but more because their natural habitat has been taken over by humans. I'm sure we are all amused at the antics and attitudes of the numerous white ibises that stroll across our lawns and streets, unconcerned about cars, pedestrians, and dogs on leashes. I've even watched individual ibis and egrets that appeared to use pedestrian crossing signals to safely cross some of our busy roads, and white egrets blissfully gliding along above cars on MLK. This type of adaptive behavior is exhibited by feathered friends just visiting our environs. To truly become urbanized, one might expect some wildlife to establish urban homes. And this is the basis for my osprey story.

Osprey are known as "fish hawks" because their primary prey is, of course, fish. In the 1970s, osprey populations were in significant decline due to the widespread use of DDT for mosquito control. DDT accumulated in the fish they consumed and caused their

eggshells to become thin and fragile, resulting in reproductive failure. At one point ospreys were placed on the endangered species list. But after DDT was banned, ospreys made a tremendous recovery and are now very common all along the Atlantic coast and in Florida. Given this high abundance, it was not too surprising to me to see and hear ospreys in and around our neighborhood, close to but not right on the water. I assumed they were passing by, perhaps traveling between Crescent Lake and Coffee Pot Bayou in their foraging.

As I shopped at either of the Publix stores near the intersection of 4th St and 38th Ave or at the Winn Dixie on MLK, I invariably heard the cheerful chirps of ospreys. I noticed that the chirping was generally more intense in the spring, the breeding season, and, given its persistence, I started to pay more attention and scan the area. It turns out that our urban ospreys have forgone any nice nesting platforms folks might have built for them over at Coffee Pot and decided that the very tall light poles around the parking lots at our local grocery stores make the perfect nesting sites.



As I write this in late March, the osprey pair at the "small" Publix are incubating eggs in their nest atop the same light pole on which they've nested for at least the last four years, at the 38th St end of the parking lot. I've watched this osprey pair conduct courtship behavior over the parking lot, gently grasping each other's talons while in the air, one upside down beneath the other, before alighting on another light pole, where more intimate behavior occurred. Now, while one sits on the nest, its mate frequently stands guard on an adjacent utility pole a short distance away; the male and female take turns incubating. After hatching, both parents will forage and bring fish back to the nest, caring for the young for about two months before they take to the air to move to foraging areas. I would suggest readers scan for osprey nests before parking; being beneath a nest of healthy young ospreys, gorging on fish, can result in less-thandesirable deposits raining down from above. I guess that's the price we pay for sharing our urban environment with its prior occupants.

Interview with Maureen Camphire - Co-Founder of the CHNA Book Club by Sharon Dubble

In 2011, Maureen and Tom Camphire moved from Jacksonville to St. Petersburg and settled into a house in Crescent Heights. They were pleased to discover that there was an active neighborhood association (CHNA) that published a newsletter and sponsored several neighborhood activities. So it was that they found themselves at a neighborhood Porch Party where Maureen met fellow neighbor, Kristen Noakes-Fry. As they talked, Maureen confessed that she missed her book club in Jacksonville and Kristen suggested that they start one here in Crescent Heights.

Thus, in 2012 the CHNA Book Club was inaugurated and, over time, became a dynamic gathering of readers and book lovers. Some years later, Kristen retired and moved to another area of the county. Although Maureen missed her co-leader, she willingly accepted responsibility for the leadership of the Book Club until finally stepping down this year. In tribute to Maureen's vision and guidance, current and past members of the Book Club organized a surprise party in May...and even arranged for Kristen to attend! Recently, Melinda Borthick and I sat down with Maureen to discuss the evolution of the CHNA Book Club.

Describe the early formative years.

Initially, it was difficult to recruit members. Although we posted a regular article in each newsletter, the group remained small, with only 5-6 members during the first several years. Gradually, interest was kindled by "word of mouth" in the neighborhood and the group expanded to 8-10 people, including some "snowbirds."

From the beginning, the major purpose of the club was to read and discuss a variety of books. Each member recommended a book for discussion and took turns hosting the group. The individual who selected the book was responsible for developing a few discussion questions. The leader was responsible for coordinating and communicating details, submitting information to the CHNA newsletter, and facilitating the discussion. This format has basically continued with a few organizational tweaks: the group now meets once a month on a set day, there is a summer break during July and August, and the group uses the December meeting as a social event to choose all the book selections for the coming year. The first December socials were held at the Melting Pot restaurant on 4th Street but are now pot-luck gatherings in a member's home.

What major challenges did you encounter during your ten years of leadership?

An enduring challenge is to skillfully facilitate the discussion in a way that maintains focus on the book and allows all members to contribute to the conversation. We want to encourage differing perspectives, interpretations, and points of view. A good facilitator ensures that all voices are respected and that all personal expressions remain confidential within the group.

The COVID pandemic presented a direct challenge to the continuation of the book club. Finding ways to proceed produced a number of comic moments as members tried to navigate Skype and then Zoom! We also experimented with meeting in Crescent Lake Park with masks and chairs six feet apart. Paradoxically, the lack of opportunities for social connection in the wider community due to COVID led to a burgeoning interest in the CHNA Book Club, particularly as new people moved into the community during the pandemic. By the time we were emerging from the strictures of COVID, the book club had become wildly successful and we were now faced with the challenge of having too many members!

What do you see as the most significant benefits of the CHNA Book Club?

Maureen's response to this question can be succinctly stated as bullet points:

- Developing friendships around a shared interest
- Building community
- Broadening your mind and expanding your knowledge through deep discussion

Maureen noted that, regardless of the books selected, universal themes arise through discussion that often lead to personal reflections and help us to see connections to our own lives and those of others.

How do you see the future of the CHNA Book Club?

I think it continues to change for the better! When the membership became too large, we made the difficult decision to start a second group in order to make discussion more manageable and, most importantly, to allow new members to join. Melinda Borthick and Sharon Dubble volunteered to be co-leaders of "Book Group 2" which began meeting in September 2022. Maureen thinks it is very possible that a third group may be formed as interest continues to grow.

The membership is also becoming a bit more diverse, reflecting the changing population of the Crescent Heights neighborhood. We are attracting some younger participants who bring suggestions for different styles of writing and add new perspectives to the discussions. And, for the first time, we have a couple of male members...and hope for more!

After ten years as leader of the CHNA Book Club, Maureen decided it was time to step down. Joanne Beckman and Sarah Hoddinott agreed to take over as co-leaders of "Book Group 1," while Maureen remains an active member. She says that, without the responsibilities of leadership, she can now participate with even greater enjoyment! Since its founding in 1924, the St. Petersburg Shuffleboard Club has been a major part of the growth of shuffleboard. The club started with four courts and 426 members, and in over ninety years, most of the notable players, amateur and professional, have played on its courts. In 2024 they celebrate their 100th year anniversary.

Well, what happens is you are always at the same angle – higher than your child. Instead, get down to their level. Sit, kneel, lay down...whatever it is, mix it up. Try something new. a photo it adds interest to your picture, and also, your low perspective is making them seem like they are bouncing higher!

Utility Assistance Program
